

This is a "FLASH" Contest because the total Contest time is limited to 16 hours divided into two 8 hours periods on two successive week-ends in February, 1970.

- 1. CONTEST DATES
  - 1st 1500-2300 GMT February 14th 1970
  - 2nd 1500-2300 GMT February 21st 1970, giving a total Contest time of 16 hours.
- 2. BANDS
  - 3.5 7 14 21 and 28 Mhz Amateurs Bands
- 3. COUNTRY STATUS

4. MESSAGES

Messages will consist of:

- a) RST Check Number
- b) Zone Number
- 5. EXCHANGE POINTS
  - a) Each two-way RTTY contact with a station in one's own Zone will receive 2 exchange points.
  - b) Each two-way contact with a station outside one's own zone will receive exchange points in accordance with the Exchange Point Table.

Note: Stations may not be contacted more than once on any one Band but additional contacts may be made with the same Station if a different Band is used. (The Zone chart is

6. LOGS AND SCORE SHEETS Use one Log for each Band.

Logs to contain: Date, Time (GMT), Call signs, Countries, RST and Zone numbers sent and received and exchange points.

All Logs must be received by March 20th, 1970.

7. MULTIPLIERS

A multipliers is given for each Country worked. A separate multipliers may be claimed for the same Country if a different Band is used.

This Contest is also open to SWL RTTYers. For the SWLs the same scoring rules are valid and a separate results table will be made for these entries.

The Logs for SWLs must contain: Date, Time (GMT) Call sign of station heard, RST and Zone Number sent by the station heard and exchange points. The same Station is only valid once on each Band.

10. AWARDS. MEDALS & FREE SUB-SCRIPTION

The Contest Committee will compile three separate lists.

- b) Classification of Station using a power of 100W or less
- c) Short Wave Listeners In each of these three classes the Awards will be made:

# RTTY-DX

Hell there. . .

Well, this is how it was. On the night of November 5th an hour or so before midnight we received a landline call from Arthur, W1WL, up in the Boston area with the astounding news that FB8ZZ on New Amsterdam Island was QRV, Arthur received the information in a QSO with George, I1CQD. George had worked the station earlier and wanted to get the news to Dusty. After Arthur's call we found Dusty on the usual evening frequency of 3635 khz and relayed the information. In the few weeks following Gilbert was on the band almost daily from FB8ZZ on about 14098 khz and commencing at about 1700z. He did QSO many of the boys in Europe. However, for the stateside fellows it was another story. Gilberts signal was inverted much of the time, the shift was about 600 hz., and he was sending and receiving on 50 Baud only. This set of conditions presents no problem to the boys in Europe and FB8ZZ is in the log of many of the RTTY'ers on the beam path, New Amsterdam to France. It is doubtful however, that many contacts were made with other areas particularly the states. This is a good example of the importance of having tunable filters and making use of the range knob so you can get copy from an otherwise garbled transmission. #### Are You Identifying Properly

Recently a number of amateurs have been cited by FCC monitoring stations for improper identification procedures. (See September 1969 QST, p. 10, and October 1969 QST, p. 90) Are you idtenfiying your RTTY transmissions properly?

Under current FCC regulations, identification of RTTY transmissions in the 3to 30-MHz amateur bands is required to be given by International Morse code (you could use voice on 10 meters if you wished, unless a future order moves RTTY operation to the lower 500 kHz of the band) at the beginning and end of each single transmission (or exchange of transmissions), and at intervals not to exceed 10 minutes of a single transmission (or exchange). No identification is required on the given, it does not alleviate the requirement for Morse identification.

Licensees are advised, therefore, that for telegraphic identification they will be expected to observe reasonable standards for code speed and keying methods. In the event that there are abuses in this area, the Commission will be obliged to set forth standards in the Rules."

So as far as hf RTTY operation, we're legal as long as we send our own call by Morse code at the beginning and end of each transmission or every ten minutes using either Al or Fl emission with a shift of 100 Hz or greater, and at a speed of 25 wpm or less. . .nothing more. Keyboard
